Welcome to the National Memorial Arboretum. Thank you for joining us today to remember those who courageously served and sacrificed on behalf of our Nation.

Today, we reflect not only on the end of the First World War, but also on the many anniversaries that remind us of the bravery and resilience demonstrated by our Armed Forces across generations.

This year at the Arboretum, the 80th anniversaries of the Battles of Monte Cassino, Kohima, Imphal, the Scheldt, Operation Market Garden and D-Day have been marked. The anniversaries of Kosovo 25 and Afghanistan 10 have also been remembered. These events, though separated by decades, are connected by the strength, bravery and care demonstrated by those who served, and their families who sacrificed at home.

Within the living landscape of the Arboretum the memorials radiate from the first dedicated, the Polar Bear, into the farthest reaches of our grounds. Each one serves as a powerful reminder that Remembrance is for all, and that 'they' mattered. After our time together today, I hope that you will be able to explore our grounds and find your own space in which to remember.

Next year at the Arboretum, which is freely open to all, we will mark 80 years since the end of the Second World War. We hope that you will be able to join us to reflect on this important time in history.
